EDITOR, The Lima News—I read your editorial in Tuesday afternoon's edition which had the caption: "There'll be Meat." I noticed that you were very careful not to use the part of Mr. Truman's speech where he stated that as early as September, 1945, he had urged the congress to extend O.P.A. until June 1, 1947 and that the congress waited until just a few days before the expiration date of O.P.A. before it sent him an unworkable bill which he could not sign; then in about six weeks sent him a makeshift bill which he reluctantly approved.

Now was the President or O.P.A. at fault for all the confusion and runaway prices that we have had? The answer is no. You also praise "the law of supply and demand under which our country has prospered for two centuries." That was the law in effect in the early thirties when we farmers were prospering on 3c hogs, 10c oats, 14c corn and 90c wheat. And we were paying six per cent to eight per cent on loans when we could find the money to pay it. But as you know many farmers could not make the payments and lost their farms.

There was no O.P.A., no bank deposit insurance, no rural electrification law then, just that good old supply and demand and free enterprise.

You also state that "government controls made us a nation of chiselers." I do not agree. The world has had chiselers ever since Jacob chiseled Esau out of his birthright. No law makes chiselers. It would be just as absurd to say that criminal laws made robbers and murderers. It is selfishness, greed and the love of money that makes chiselers and thieves.

We had income tax chiselers long before O.P.A. was ever thought of. If the congress had

## Coal Production At Record Mark

WASHINGTON, Oct. 19—(AP)—A record production of soft coal since the Navy took over the pits last May was announced tonight by Capt. N. H. Collisson, the coal mines administrator.

In a report to Secretary of the Interior Krug, Collisson said bituminous production since the Navy took charge on May 21 totals 218,715,000 tons, against 197,076,000 tons for the comparable period last year. Because of a strike in the spring, the total to date for all 1946 is 45,000,000 tons below 1945.

But Collisson said the June, July, August and September output was the greatest for those months in mining history. Usually they are a period of slack operations.

"The record is gratifying since it was made possible only thru the cooperation of the operators and the miners," Collisson declared.

## Byrnes' Speech Draws Praise

GENESEO, N. Y., Oct. 19—(AP)—Rep. James W. Wadsworth (R-NY) tonight described Secretary of State Byrnes' speech on the Paris peace conference and U. S. foreign policy as "very well phrased."

Wadsworth, a member of the house foreign affairs committee, said in an interview that "our foreign policy is correct—we can use a degree of firmness without surrendering our fundamental beliefs."

Although describing Russian foreign policy as "unreasonable and mistaken," Wadsworth said: "I agree with Mr. Byrnes in that we should be patient as well as firm. I am not pessimistic about the prospects of world peace."

## Plant Boosts Dollar Volume

PITTSBURGH, Oct. 19—(AP)—Despite scarcity of raw materials, Westinghouse Electric Corp.'s big East Pittsburgh plant has boosted dollar volume shipments to the highest peak in its peacetime history. T. I. Phillips, vice president, said here today at "family day" festivities.

Phillips said, however, the company has less than three weeks' supply of pig iron on hand and blamed strikes and "artificial price controls" for "seriously" reducing the flow of raw materials.
