CREDIT CONTROL EASING STUDIED

WASHINGTON, Nov. 1.—(UP)—The Federal Reserve Board is considering removal of installment-buying restrictions from all clothing and from durable articles, like refrigerators and radios, costing less than about \$50, an informed source said today.

The board, it was said, probably will not relax its wartime curbs on installment buying until next January—after the Christmas shopping. No decision has been reached yet on whether furniture would be freed from the regulations.

The proposed revisions would leave regulations on only automobiles, refrigerators, washing machines, radios, electric cooking stoves and similar articles—and possibly furniture—costing more than the minimum. The exact amount of the minimum has not been decided.

Board regulations now require a one-third down payment on most items purchased on the installment plan. A 20 per cent down

Surplus Sales Exceeds Hopes

WASHINGTON, Nov. 1.—(INS)—Secretary of State Brynes reported today that the return so far obtained for overseas surplus property has far exceeded the total hoped for at the beginning of the disposal program.

Brynes submitted to congress the report of the Foreign Liquidation Commission, which showed that by Sept. 30, 1946, property with original cost to the United States of \$5,870,000,000 had been sold for \$1,400,000,000.
