In other words, the volume charge shall be computed as if there were only one meter. However, there shall be a demand charge for each additional meter required on the private supply. This demand charge will be 30% of the demand charge shown in the schedule of rates.

(d) Flat Rates, The superintendent is authorized to establish flat rates for residence properties which contribute sewage but not connected to the public water supply system. The minimum flat rate charge shall be \$3.00 per year.
