

**Hook, Line and Sinker**

Possible need for a law regulating the size of holes that may be cut in the ice for winter fishing has arisen as the result of unusual practices developed in an unusual year on Lake Mendota.

Unseasonably mild weather has brought out thousands of fishermen on several Saturdays and Sundays this winter. So large were the throngs that concentrations in various favored spots looked for all the world to be a distant observer on shore, like "rafts of ducks" in the fall migration season.

When a fisherman finds that many fishermen on the ice at one time, you find many different kinds of people, with many different ideas about fishing, and many different concepts of what is right and wrong.

The average experienced fisherman never cuts a hole more than 6 or 10 inches in diameter to angle for perch or even larger fish.

But on one of our recent beautiful Sundays, a veteran fisherman was astonished when he came upon a man who had cut a hole fully two feet wide and four feet long.

The veteran fisherman explained. A boy, or even a grown man, might fall into it and drown, or, if he happened to walk over the spot unsuspectingly the next day, after a light freeze, he might crash through the thin ice to his death.

But his reasonings and warnings neither abashed nor convinced the unorthodox fisherman. "I like to cut a hole big enough," he explained, "so the fish can swim around a before I land 'em."

Subsequent reference to the statutes, and inquiry at the conservation department, disclosed nothing in the present ice fishing regulations to restrict the size of a fishing hole.

There is a statute, outside the fishing regulations, that might fit the situation, but some lawyers have expressed doubt about it, because it was designed specifically to provide safeguards in commercial ice removal. It is Sec. 340.67 and is entitled "Leaving Unguarded Ice Holes." It reads:

"Any person who shall remove ice or cause its removal from any stream, pond or lake, and shall neglect to place around the margin of the opening made by such removal a fence, by setting posts of not less than two by four in size and with a fence board thoroughly nailed thereto not less than three and one half feet above the surface of the ice on said stream pond or lake, shall be punished by imprisonment in the county jail not less than six months or by a fine not exceeding one hundred dollars."

References to whitefish (disco) as an "extinct species" in Lake Mendota are inaccurate, according to the hopeful Prof. Arthur Hasler, University of Wisconsin limnologist.

They undoubtedly are at a low cycle, possibly a permanently low cycle, but a possibility still remains that they may reappear in numbers he deems large.

His statement was based upon unmistakable evidence.
