KENDALL, Fla.—(U.P.)—Farmer Carroll Klotzbach claims he is no miracle man, but he can poke cucumber seeds into a bed of

gravel and get two, three or even four crops a year. His business is hydroponics. It is a comparatively new science in farming in which crops get their nourishment from liquid

fertilizer, or chemicals, rather than from the earth directly. Many Florida farmers have gone broke attempting to farm in this new cientific way, but Klotzbach, long a student of horticulture, is an exception.

'Farm' Is Half-Acre

His farm, covering only a half-acre near this town just south of Miami, is operated by himself and his wife whom he describes

as a jack-of-all-trades.

The trouble with most hydroponic farmers, according to Klotzbach, is that they shouldn't have started in the business in

have started in the business in the first place.

Klotzbach, now completing eight new hydroponic beds, has instituted several innovations. He has developed a means by which the chemically-treated water will not overflow the beds and will

Klotzbach's farm will have eight beds, each 100 feet long, 8 inches deep and 3½ feet wide. He plans to fill these with fresh water gravel, imported from up-state Florida. The gravel in these parts has too much chemical. Once the gravel is in place, the seeds are to be sown and the chemically treated solution permitted to seep into the beds. This "feeding" of the crops may be

done several times a day for a crop of cucumbers that require much water, or it may be done only every three or four days for some types of flowers such as some types of flowers such as carnations.

Dirt Farming Still Best

Klotzbach said that hydroponic farming should be attempted only where there is no good earth. In the northern states, some hydroponic plants have been installed in hot houses.

The science is practical only in the tropics or sub-tropical country. During the war the govern-ment experimented with hydro-ponics in the hope that fresh

vegetables could be grown on far-off Pacific isles. Some of the experiments were carried on at a hospital here and wounded veterans were trained as hydroponic farmers. The ex-periments are continuing.
