Belgians See End of Collaboration Trials

BRUSSELS-(ONA)-By the end of this year, all scheduled collaborationist trials will have ended, government officials pre-dict, and the special courts-mar-

tial will be dissolved.

To date, 23,860 indicted Belgians have been sentenced, and of that number 2,550 have been 6,330 at working at various industries within prison walls, while some 15,000 are assigned to more or less menial government tasks. A total of 148, who received capital sentence, have been executed, while 199 others simi-larly sentenced have had those sentences commuted to life imprisonment.


