# Lutherans Hold Centennial Fete

1,564,000 Represented at Chicago Parley

Delegates representing more than 5,000 congregations and preaching stations with a total of 1,564,000 adherents are in session in Chicago for the centennial convention of the Evangelical Lutheran Synod of Missouri, Ohio and Other States. The convention will be in session until Tuesday.

The following churches and pastors in Madison held membership in the Missouri Synod: Emmanuel, 1101 Jennifer st., Pastor F. C. Brandhorst; Calvary University church, 713 State st., Pastors William C. Burhop and Eugene F. Klug; Mount Olive, West-Monroe, Pastor H. A. Neuberger; Monona, Pastor A. R. Rind; the Rev. Theodore Andrus, Institutional pastor.

On Monday at 3:30 p. m. WIBA will broadcast a centennial transcription program entitled "This Land Under God." This will portray the centennial history of the Missouri Synod has made to the spiritual welfare of our country during the past century.

An historic pastoral service was held on Friday, in First St. Paul's Lutheran church in which edifice, later located at 251 E. Center st., the constitution of the Evangelical Lutheran Synod of Missouri, Ohio and Other States, was effected on Apr. 26, 1847.

On Sunday a gigantic centennial rally will be held at Soldiers Field, where Dr. J. W. Benken, president of the Missouri Synod, will preach the sermon to a congregation which it is estimated will be in excess of 100,000. Special trains, buses and chartered planes will bring Lutherans from all points for this centennial celebration.

# Week Left to File Decontrol Reports

Hotels, motor courts, and tourist homes that decontrolled rentals July 1 under the new rent act have only one more week in which to legalize their action by filing decontrol reports with the current office, John P. Bossel, area rent director, warned today.

Such establishments were allowed 30 days after July 1 to file the reports. Otherwise the accommodations will remain under control until proper forms are filed and any July rent increases must be ruled overruled.

Accommodations that were eligible for decontrol July 1 include all motor courts, tourist homes serving transient guests exclusively, new construction and conversions completed after Feb. 1.
