## Nantucket Hospital Must Depend on Self

NANTUCKET, Mass.—(U.P.)—A hospital 30 miles at sea has its troubles.

The tiny Cottage Hospital, serving Nantucket Island, is isolated in storm or fog and must be entirely self-sufficient.

In addition, it must arrange its staff and housekeeping to accommodate the needs of 2,500 persons in the winter and 15,000 in the summer.

Despite the handicaps, Nantucket's hospital is accredited Class A by the American Medical Association, maintains 24-hour X-Ray and laboratory facilities and is equipped as well as many city hospitals.

Operation of the hospital is made possible through contributions of residents and "off islanders" who visit here.

## Reece Says CIO, Democrats Misrepresent New Labor Law

WASHINGTON—(U.P.)—Republican National Chairman Carroll Reece said Saturday night the CIO and the Democrats are spreading confusion among workers as to the "fair-labor and meaning" of the "Fair-Labor" labor law.

This confusion has been created, he charged, by the propaganda efforts of some union labor leaders who hope to continue unbridled dictatorial control of workers and by the "politically-motivated antagonism of the Democratic administration," from the president on down.
