GIRL SHOTS FIANCE OVER LIPSTICK SMEARS
 CINCINNATI, Sept. 30—(AP) A pretty 21-year-old brunette was charged with shooting with intent to kill after she admitted in a statement, Detective Chief Clem Merz said, that she shot and wounded her fiance today when she found lipstick smears on his face and shirt.
 The girl, Louise Sharpe, former War Assets Administration office worker, was released on \$2,000 bond furnished by her family.
 The gun victim, Paul J. Streicher, 33, a druggist, was reported in serious condition at General Hospital. He was shot twice in the chest and once in the back, Merz said. The shooting occurred in Streicher's apartment.

TWO DAMAGE ACTIONS SETTLED FOR \$3,500

Evelyn M. Frelie and Kadi Toth, both of Bridgeport, accepted a total of \$3,500 yesterday in settlement of negligence actions in which they claimed damages of \$10,000 and \$5,000, respectively, against Joseph Herman and his daughter, Nellie Herman, both of this city.
 The plaintiffs claimed they were injured about 9:15 p.m. Nov. 28, 1945, when they were struck by Herman's auto, driven by Miss Herman, while crossing the highway at Fairfield avenue and Ellsworth street.
 The settlement brought to an end a two days' trial before Judge Kenneth Wynne and a Superior court jury. Coles and O'Connell were counsel for the plaintiffs. George N. Foster represented the defendants.

POLAND'S CLERGY HIT PERSECUTION BY RED REGIME

CZESTOCHOWA, Poland, Sept. 30—(AP) Poland's Roman Catholic bishops charged today the existence of a "carefully directed and hidden struggle" in Poland against the church.
 A pastoral letter sent to all churches in this 95 per cent Catholic country assailed the Communist-supported Warsaw government for what the bishops said was severe censorship of the Catholic press and called for abolition of "baseless and unnecessary limitations on civil rights."
 The bishops, in conference at the Shrine of the Holy Virgin here, charged in their letter that Catholics were subjected to pressure "to join political parties with principles in disagreement with the holy faith."
 Apparently referring to the Communist-controlled Workers Party, which holds the top position in the Polish government, the letter said that Catholics were threatened with loss of employment if they failed to join a certain political party. This, the letter said, was "regrettable," and caused further division among the Polish people.
 The bishops deplored what they called "the contemptible attitude" of pro-government publications, which they said "made fun of religious ceremonies, Christian customs and usages." The letter urged Catholics not to buy such newspapers.
 Priests were quoted as saying they were unable to speak freely in their sermons for fear of arrest by the Polish security police.

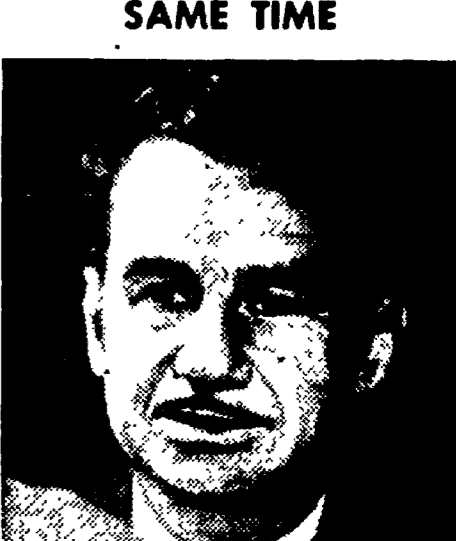
