Court Gives Share of Loot to Gangsters

CHICAGO—(U.P.)—A court-approved settlement today awarded three convicted gangsters, includ-ing Roger "The Terrible" Touhy, part of the loot from a currency exchange robbery.

Touhy and four henchmen al-

legedly held up the Northern Currency exchange Dec. 28, 1942, after they had escaped from State-ville penitentiary. \$13,605 Recovered

Three of the gangsters, including Touhy, later were captured. The other two were killed. In their possession was found \$13,-

605, representing most of the loot The surviving gangsters were

The surviving gangsters were returned to the penitentiary, and it never was proved that they participated in the holdup. Instead of spending money for lawyers' fees and court costs, the currency exchange agreed to settle its claim for \$9,532.

Under the settlement, the remaining \$4,073 will be divided among the three survivors—Touhy, Basil "The Owl" Banghart, and Edward Darlak—and among the estates of Eugene Langthorne the estates of Eugene Langthorne

and St. Clair McInerney. Foe of Capone

Probate Judge William Waugh approved the agreement.

Touhy was one of Chicago's most feared gangsters of the prohibition era. He was one of the few to oppose Scarface Al Capone and live to tell about it.

He now is serving a 299-year term in Stateville, the longest penitentiary sentence on record. Touhy originally was convicted of the kidnaping of Jack "The Barber" Factor, notorious confidence man. Time was added to his sentence after his 1942 escape.
