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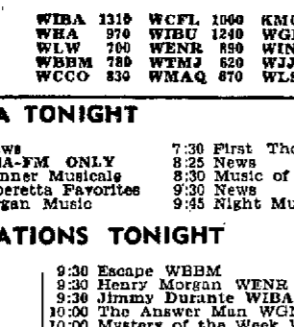

Governor Signs Omnibus Bill

Measure Extends Vet Housing Privileges

The omnibus bill passed by the Wisconsin legislature at its short session last month was signed into law today by Gov. Rennebohm.

The bill started out merely as a revisor's measure to correct conflicts in laws passed earlier by the 1947 legislature. The senate and assembly added 24 amendments, many of them containing new provisions.

Major changes made by the amendments:

Put a \$125-a-month limit on public contributions to pensions for Milwaukee city and county employees.

Make any Wisconsin veteran eligible for admission to public veterans' housing projects. This removes the previous requirement that only veterans living in the county where they resided at the time they joined the service could be admitted.

Continue state aids to school districts with suspended schools for another year. About \$159,000 from a balance in school aid funds is granted to pay 1948 aids to suspended school districts.

Allow six, instead of two, years for doctors and other professional men to file suits for payment for professional services.

Require 14 and 15-year-olds to prove that they need motor scooters to get to school or work before they can obtain permits to drive them. The act also increases the weight limit of motor scooters permitted under Wisconsin law.

Permit landlords to evict tenants in 30 days if the landlord or any member of his immediate family have serious disability or prolonged illness.

Allow eviction cases to be brought before a justice of the peace.

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Blaze Ruins Store; Firemen Save Invalid

MARSHFIELD—(U.P.)—Montgomery Ward and Co. officials today sought to estimate the damage caused by a fire that gutted a two-story building Tuesday night.

Manager R. K. Rickard said no accurate estimate of the damage to the stock could be made until an inventory was taken of warehouse stock. He said the store contained tires, paints, hardware, radios, and stoves.

The fire, which originated along a basement ceiling on the north side of the store, spread to four apartments above the store.

The only occupant at the time, invalid Archie Schubert, was rescued by firemen.

Adjoining buildings suffered smoke and water damage, firemen said.

They are Ferd Schmidt, Delmar, Ia.; Karl Hoffman, Ida Grove, Ia., and Hugh Morris, Alnsworth, Ia. All have exhibited champion loads of fat steers at past International Live Stock exhibitions.

A total of \$6,000 is offered in four classes as prize money. The classes are for carloads of 20 yearling steers, 20 steer calves, 20 yearling heifers, and 20 heifer calves.

All entries will be sold at auction after judging.
