Q. What bird flies most slowly? V. M.

A. The slowest flight thus far recorded is for a woodcock that was able to maintain itself in the air at a low speed of five miles an hour.

Q. Which is the largest railroad in the United States in respect to the miles of track operated? R. M. K.

A. The Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe Railroad, with 13,092 miles of railroad, ranks first in miles of road operated.

Q. What is a fractured bone a broken bone? R. S.

A. A fractured bone and a broken bone are one and the same thing. There are four classes of fractures: complete and incomplete; simple and compound.

Q. Which is older, the United States Capitol or the British Houses of Parliament? D. McD.

A. The capitol is the older building. The Houses of Parliament are modern, dating from 1840-50, but they enshrine Westminster Hall which is over 800 years old, having survived the fire of 1834 which destroyed the other parliamentary buildings.

Q. What is the botanical name of the plant from which coffee is obtained? W. E. Y.

A. All the many variants of coffee are obtained from shrubs of the genus *Coffea*, which includes 40 species. 19 of them of economic value. Of these, *Coffea arabica* makes up the bulk of world production.

Q. What became of Thomas Paine after the American Revolution? Did he remain in the United States? L. V.

A. Paine returned to Europe in 1787, became involved in the French Revolution and spent 10 months in prison. After his release he came back to America in 1802 and, suffering from ill health, wandered from place to place until his death in New York City in 1809.
