CITY'S VOCATIONAL COST UP \$86,835

Madison's tax for support of the vocational school in 1948 will be \$86,835 greater than this year's. The vocational education board's budget estimate released today by permission of City Manager Howell.

Under the law adopted by the 1947 legislature, permitting vocational school boards to increase their tax demands upon cities from 1 1/2 to 2 mills, the Madison board has asked the city to pay \$325,000 toward its total budget of \$435,000. The balance will come from state aids and other revenue sources.

The 1947 tax levy was \$238,165 against a total budget of \$358,000. Britain is to send 52 ships and four whaling factories to the Antarctic during the next whaling season.

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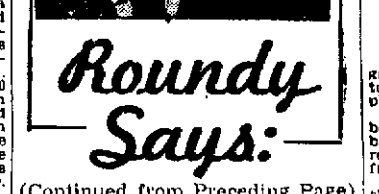
