Q. Is money still sent to the Conscience Fund of the U. S. Treasury? What is done with this money? V. A. N. A. Contributions from persons who feel that they owe money to the government are still received anonymously. In 1946 amounts ranged from 1 cent to \$1226.09. All contributions go into the general fund of the Treasury.

Q. What great scientist was so absent-minded that he boiled his watch instead of an egg? T. E. H.

A. The story is told of Sir Isaac Newton. He is said to have prepared to boil an egg for three minutes by placing his watch in the boiling water and holding the egg in his hand.

Q. I have a son buried in the 77th Division Cemetery on Okinawa. Is this a permanent cemetery? J. F.

A. The location of permanent cemeteries in the Pacific areas has not been decided. The 77th Infantry Division Cemetery at Ie Shima is not permanent.

Q. Why must a soldier wear two identification tags? H. L.

A. This is required by Army Regulations. In case a soldier is killed, one tag is left on the body and interred with it. The duplicate tag is removed and put on the grave marker or on the casket, if the body is shipped.

Q. Who starred in "Lady Windermere's Fan" when it was produced in New York about the time of World War I? F. O. D.

A. In the 1914 production, Margaret Anglin played the part of Mrs. Erlynne.

Q. When did the great tenor, Enrico Caruso, make his first phonograph recording? I. T.

A. Caruso made his first recordings, 10 operatic numbers, on Feb. 1, 1904, and reputedly was paid \$4000 for the afternoon's work.

Q. What proportion of the human body is blood? D. Z.

A. Physiologists vary in their estimates, but it probably amounts to something like one-tenth of the weight of the body. A healthy, normal person may lose as much as one-third of his blood without a fatal result.

McKENNEY ON BRIDGE

(First in a series of six special lesson hands.) With the increased interest in tournament bridge, this coming winter undoubtedly will be the biggest in the history of contract. In my travels I am impressed by the number of good bridge players both in the United States and in Canada.

I am devoting this week's articles to pointers which will give you a better understanding of the game, and every Thursday from now on I will give you a hand which I believe will improve your bridge.

First of all let us study the bidding of today's hands. Some players might pass the South hand. However, most tournament players will open the bidding with one spade. When North bids two diamonds, South will bid two spades, and North then will take the hand to four spades.

If South does pass on the first round and North opens up the bidding with one diamond, South should bid two spades, not one.

Answer to Question No. 1

Probably so. Psychologist Dudycha found among 129 college students, that the women reported considerably more experiences of getting hopping mad than did the men. However, the women also reported more joyful experiences, and they were three times as likely to report experiences of shame and guilt.

Answer to Question No. 2

No! Drivers who have one accident nearly always keep on having accidents. In one group studied by the Personnel Research Federation, 4 1/2 per cent of the drivers had 30 per cent of the accidents—seven times their quota. In another group, 800 drivers had 4000 accidents—an average of five per driver—400 had 3200 accidents—eight per driver—and 800 had 10,800 accidents—13 1/2 per driver! One hundred drivers who killed one person had previously killed three, and had had 38 other accidents.

Answer to Question No. 3

Yes, by studying their grades and college honors. On the Supreme Court bench of 1940, seven to nine justice were members of the Phi Beta Kappa—an honor fraternity. Among the 72 members of the Hall of Fame, 32—all who had had an opportunity—had made Phi Beta Kappa.
