Lichter Asks Sanity to Combat Hysteria

Free Masons were urged to guard against "undemocratic collectivism which threatens the nation," by Dr. Melvin H. Lichter, grand prior of the Supreme Council of the 33rd degree of the northern U. S. jurisdiction, in a talk before 900 Scottish Rite Masons in the Masonic temple Friday night.

Fears Nazi Slogan

"Just now Free masonry is gravely concerned because of the drift of public affairs. For more than 25 years we have witnessed the steady, progressive betrayal of the individual. (The Nazi slogan) 'thou art nothing, the state is all', has spread like wildfire all over the world. It denies the privilege of voluntary cooperation. It has done its best to destroy individual initiative and free enterprise."

INDIANAPOLIS—(U.P.)—A mysterious "woman in black" was among three women sought today as suspects in the slaying of socially prominent Mrs. Mabel McRifield, 68. State county and city authorities cooperating in the investigation said they were convinced that Mrs. Merrifield was stabbed by another woman as they arranged a flower setting in her isolated home near suburban Beech Grove. They admitted, however, that they could learn no motive for the murder.

20 Billion Foreign Aid Since War's End Told

WASHINGTON—(U.P.)—The United States has furnished or authorized between \$19,000,000,000 and \$20,000,000,000 in foreign aid since the end of the war, according to the joint congressional committee on federal spending. Committee Chairman Harry F. Byrd (D-Va.) said this estimate includes proposed stop-gap aid to Europe, but does not take into consideration the Marshall plan for long-range rehabilitation. Sixteen western European nations are seeking more than \$20,000,000,000 in aid under the plan.

Struggle of Jews in China Discussed

Problems of the Jewish community in China were discussed by David Zysman, former manager of the "voice of democracy" underground radio station in Shanghai and resident of the Far East for more than 40 years, at the Beth El Temple Friday night. Zysman told the struggle for survival of Jewish refugees from Europe during the years of Japanese occupation and of actions by Jews of Russian extraction to save them. He also told of the work of the Shanghai Bund Birth League in establishing widespread educational facilities and a non-sectarian hospital.

Big British Vote Expected Today

LONDON—(U.P.)—Municipal elections in England and Wales attracted millions of voters today in the first major test of political trends since Britain's economic crisis began. Both the Labor and Conservative parties campaigned on national issues. Most political observers predicted that Conservatives would gain. At stake were 3,199 municipal councillor posts in 392 boroughs. Interest was so high that about half the 15,000,000 eligible voters were expected to ballot. Usually, only 30 or 40 per cent of the eligibles vote.
