

Fullerton Grids Overpower Anaheim, 40-7

FULLERTON, Nov. 8. Bill Straw, hard-hitting quarterback, paced a powerful Fullerton High eleven to a decisive 40-7 conquest of Anaheim High in a Sunset League contest last night played before a Homecoming Day throng of 7000 spectators in Fullerton Stadium.

Straw scored all three of his touchdowns in the third period to lead the Indians to their largest triumph of the year. Bob Boaz, brilliant halfback, set up Straw's first tally when he rambled 56 yards to put the ball on the Colonists' 12-yard line. Boaz then hit Straw with a forward pass for the tally. Straw racked up his second tally midway in the period with a 17-yard jaunt into the end zone and capped his scoring activities later with a four-yard plunge into pay dirt.

In the final stanza Bob Ferguson, under study for the very capable Mr. Boaz, ran up Fullerton's final score on a fancy 34-yard dash into touchdown territory.

With the victory, Fullerton took a commanding lead for the Sunset League spot in the Southeast section C, I, E playoffs. The Indians are deadlocked with Santa Ana with three victories and one defeat while Orange now has three wins, one loss and a tie after their 6-6 deadlock last night with Huntington Beach. Fullerton plays the Oilers next week and faces Orange in the finale.

SAN PEDRO, Nov. 8. Uncovering a sensational aerial attack, led by Don Bahran, and taking full advantage of a terrific line charge which rocked the Pirate ship of San Pedro High from stem to stern, the Mohicans of Gardena High yesterday rolled into a tie for the Marine League leadership with a 13-6 victory over the rampaging Buccs.

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Court Ends Ban on Amish 'Outcast'

WOOSTER, Ohio, Nov. 8. (AP) The life of a social outcast was declared by court order at the end of Andrew J. Yoder today, and the 33-year-old Amish farmer pronounced himself satisfied.

As far as civil authority was concerned, Yoder's quarrel with four Amish church officials over "miting" or boycotting was settled by (1) an award of \$5000 damages, and (2) a court injunction restraining those officials from imposing social bans upon church members.

"I am satisfied," said Yoder stolidly after he heard yesterday's verdict by a non-Amish jury. "I believe the injunction will do more good than the damages."

"I think they (the churchmen) will think some time before they put on any more bans."

Yoder had been "mited" or boycotted for the last five years because he transferred his membership from the Helmuth Church to the Bunker Hill district congregation where he would be allowed to purchase an automobile to transport his invalid daughter to a hospital here for treatment.

Yoder had asked \$40,000 damages, complaining that he felt like a "whipped dog" under the ban because so many of his neighbors refused to deal with him on a social or business basis.

Yoder yesterday's verdict ended the three-day trial, the defendants already had gone to their farm homes. The four—Bishop John W. Helmuth of Beach City, Ministers Isaac I. Miller of Apple Creek and John J. Nisley of Fredericksburg and Deacon Emmanuel Wengend of Beach City—could not be reached for comment.
