Philips Tells Needs of German Schools

Handicaps in the way of the re-educational program in the American zone of Germany were described Monday night by Prof. Burr W. Phillips, of the University of Wisconsin, who visited Germany last winter, in an address to 160 members of the Washington school Parent Teachers

Prof. Phillips told of his observations as an adviser on the social sciences to the American military government authorities and expressed hope for the success of the present program. He told of short-ages of non-Nazi teachers, food,

fuel, and school supplies. The speaker was introduced by Mrs. M. E. Mellor, chairman of the program committee.
