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ITALIAN LEFTISTS STAGE PEACEFUL PROTEST IN GENOA

ROME, Nov. 30.—(AP) Leftists closed a month of protest against the government today with a parade of 10,000 partisans in Genoa and a Communist chief writing of the possibility of civil war.

A dispatch from Genoa said a peaceful parade and mass meeting in the northern seaport attracted demonstrators from throughout the surrounding region of Liguria.

Communist Leader Palmiro Togliatti, writing in the party's Rome newspaper, L'Unita, said the Christian Democratic government of Premier Alcide De Gasperi had provoked public demonstrations Friday and yesterday in Milan in efforts to find a pretext for "outlawing the Communist party."

"Today in Italy, to invoke putting the Communists outside the law," he declared, "is to invoke civil war, a civil war in which I believe many now have understood that the defeated will not be us, who, however, do not want civil war."

Benedetto Croce, 81, philosopher and statesman, told the Liberal party in its fourth national congress tonight to look neither to the right nor to the left.

He said the four years since the Liberal's reorganization had "confirmed" the necessity for "a party whose fundamental task would be the reacquaintance of liberty and its defense" in the face of "totalitarian tendencies that remained" and "other totalitarianisms that are not Fascist or Nazi."

Both L'Unita and the pro-Communist socialist newspaper Avanti! accused the government today of having organized a plan of "military suppression" in Milan.

Demonstrators in Milan Friday surrounded the prefecture, the provincial government building, to protest the interior ministry's decision to transfer Ettore Troilo, who has headed the province as prefect since the liberation.

Many Italians believed the delay was connected with the Italian left-led drive against the De Gasperi government.

Mr. Gen. Lawrence C. Jaynes, U. S. theater commander, was reached by telephone at his Leghorn headquarters and confirmed a spokesman's report, issued yesterday, that the Admiral Sims would not leave next Wednesday as had been planned.

CANADIAN CHOSEN AS 'WHEAT KING'

CHICAGO, Nov. 30—(AP) A Canadian grain grower, S. J. Allison of Red Deer Alta, Can., today was adjudged "wheat king" of North America at the 48th International Livestock Exposition.

His sample of reward variety of hard red spring wheat was judged the finest of hundreds of choice samples in the hay and grain show, held in conjunction with the International Livestock Exposition.

The reserve wheat championship went to Gene V. Peterson of Corvallis, Mont., for his Marquis variety of hard winter wheat.

Amy Kelsoy, of Erickson, B. C., Canada, the 1946 wheat champion and the only woman ever to be crowned "wheat queen," was defeated by Allison in class competition.

Walter J. Harpel, 45-year-old Crawfordville, Ind., grain grower, was crowned "corn king" of the United States and Canada when his 10-year variety of yellow dent hybrid 444 variety was selected as the best in the show.

The title of "corn prince" went to Henry Scott, 11-year-old 4-H Club boy from Hendersonville, Tenn., and the reserve title went to Jack Lux of Shelbyville, Ind., son of Edward H. Lux, the 1931 "corn king."

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PORTRAIT OF TWIN PRESENTED MEMORIAL

HARTFORD, Nov. 30—(AP)—Mark Twain's 112th birthday anniversary was celebrated today with the presentation of the S. J. Woolf portrait of the humorist to the Mark Twain library and Memorial Commission here.

Walter Russell, New York sculptor and artist, was the main speaker at the ceremonies held at the memorial home on Farmington Avenue. Mr. Russell is the sculptor of the model of a proposed Mark Twain memorial. There are 28 figures representing leading characters from Twain's stories in the model, and it is hoped the memorial will be erected in Washington, D.C.

The Woolf portrait was recently discovered in Boston by Carl Greger, local artist and restorer, and has been contributed to the library by a group of people associated with the memorial. The portrait will hang in the children's room of the building.
