Q. What is the method of determining the high school national basketball champion? L. N. K.

The 3-letter word flag means the spot where a piece of turf has been cut out, flag, a flag or slab of stone, literally a flake.

When the hand was over, I said "Charlie, what were you thinking about for so long?" "I was counting my tricks," he replied. "I could trump three hearts in dummy, cash the ace and king of diamonds and the ace and king of clubs. That would give me seven tricks. So I had to get in three of the trumps in my own hand."

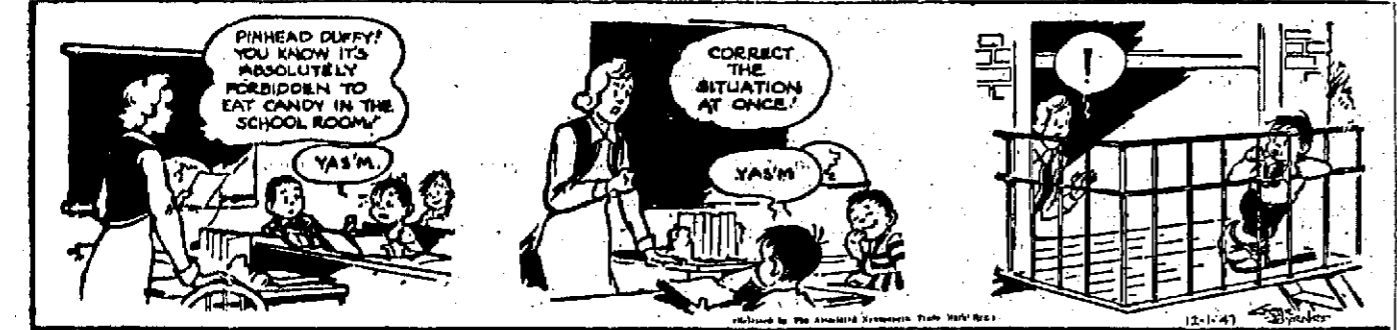
