

SPORTS TRAIL

NEW YORK, Dec. 4.—(AP) Well, suppose Jersey Joe Walcott does defeat Louie in their heavyweight championship bout at Madison Square Garden tomorrow night. He won't, of course, barring an unforeseen accident, such as the Bomber slipping and breaking a leg.

But, suppose that unforeseen circumstance presented itself. What would happen? Well, for one thing, we think the fight would be the darndest scuffle among heavyweights for a shot at the title that anyone ever saw. It would make the argument for first place after Gene Tunney rolled seem like a conversation about the weather.

Star Clear of Louie
Right now there are no logical opponents for Louie's title. But if he abruptly should lose that title, the place would be swarming with aspirants. They'd ooze out from the woodwork, come out from under rocks, jump from behind trees. There'd be a million of them.

The fact is that, with scant exceptions, such as Jersey Joe, nobody wants to climb into the ring with the champion. He's so much in a class by himself that only the lure of fat dollars will make a man brave the dynamite of those deadly fists.

But should Walcott be the champion, every heavyweight who could climb one flight of steps without puffing like a locomotive or a steep grade would be ready with a challenge. They want no part of Louie, but they aren't afraid of Walcott. They know him well.

Walcott might have to start all over on that string of challengers who were enticed into the ring with the Bomber, much to their physical discomfort and financial pain. Even some of those who have retired might flex rusty arms, pour manly sweat into gymnasium, and hunt up the nearest gymnasium.

Such a two-tenths-of-a-penny as Billy Conn and Arthur Grady would sweep the field, and particularly Walcott, and reckon it was their turn to mount the pedestal. Even some of those pugilists of a decade ago, now just names in the "keyhole" record of the champion, might suddenly discover they had as good a chance to be titleholder as the next man.

The fact is, there are two heavyweight classes. Joe Louis, and the rest of the field. As long as Joe-Louis, that is, is champion, the rest of the field will remain discreetly in the background.

Whoever takes over the Bomber's crown, whether it is Walcott, son-up and coming youngster, or the heavy-handed, heavy-punch, or a guy who becomes champion through the retirement of the Bomber, will find challengers galore.

Gene Fears Champion
Gene Fears, the light-heavyweight champion, has wisely maintained that he wanted no part of Louie. He'll battle any other heavyweights, though, and he'd probably be among the first to bid for a shot at Walcott, should Walcott win the crown.

Of course, should Walcott by chance win, Louie probably would get the first chance at the crown, but if, for some reason, he didn't want to fight again or Walcott postponed a return meeting, everybody would want to get into the act.

There is an little competition in the heavyweight class right now. That's only because Joe-Louis is champion. Take him out of the picture and there would be competition galore, as if you could name one other fighter that stands out above the rest.

So if Louie loses tomorrow night Walcott won't look for bouts. He'll have to hire a bodyguard to keep the contenders off his front porch. He's just one of the boys as far as the other heavies are concerned. Louie is Mr. Champion, and they want no part of him.
