A lot of people who plan on building a garage, tool shed or some other building next spring are spending the winter in the basement making



concrete block forms now on the concrete block forms now on the market. A good mixture to use for those blocks is one part cement, two parts sand and five parts gravel. Pour easy on the water. Five gallons to each sack of cement is about right.

People who burn wood for heating purposes, and there are a lot of them, may be interested to know that they get a good dent from heat out of a cord of hickory oak and maple than they will out of pine or alder.

If you've just moved into a newly constructed home, don't go after the contractor with an ax because the basement walls are damp. Poured concrete contains a lot of water and it takes several months before it evaporates.

It is sometimes noted the "cemented" - possible to remove that white cloud from shellacked or varnished surfaces by dampening a cloth in denatured alcohol and making a couple of quick passes over the white spots. The alcohol softens up the finish so that the moisture can get out. Therefore be careful not to touch the finish for several hours as it will be soft and sticky.

STATE SEEKS TO FIX COUGH DROPS' STATUS

HARTFORD, Dec. 7.—(AP) State Attorney General William L. Hadden today tossed the question, whether or not cough drops are candy or drugs, right back into state food and drug Commissioner Frederick H. Holbrook's lap.

Mr. Holbrook recently asked for a legal opinion on the question as he would know whether or not

cough drop manufacturers or wholesalers should be required to pay a \$50 license fee to the state for the privilege of dealing in drugs.

"While the term 'cough drop' has

acquired a fairly definite meaning in ordinary conversational use," Mr. Hadden said, "I do not believe any rule of this office holding an article merely described as a 'cough drop' to be a drug or not would be legally sound."

Mr. Hadden explained that there might be cough drops that are drugs and there might be some that are not. At any rate, it is impossible to set down a definite and blanket rule.
