Q. Who was the little girl who wrote to the editor of a New York newspaper to ask if there really was a Santa Claus? G. L. G.

A. In 1897, Virginia O'Hanlon, then 8 years old, wrote to the New York Sun: "Please tell me the truth. Is there a Santa Claus?" The editorial reply has become a Christmas classic. In 1945 the newspapers carried pictures of Virginia (Mrs. Edward Douglas), telling the story of Santa Claus to a group of children at a Christmas party. At that time she was assistant principal in a New York City school.

Q. What races are included in the term Amerind? A. F. G.

A. Indian, Amerindian, American, or Red race designate that great division of mankind which is native to America. To avoid confusion arising from the popular use of the word "American" to indicate the imported Caucasian stock, Brinton called the natives "Amerinds," a contraction of the term "American Indians." This race includes all the aborigines of North, Central and South America, with the possible exception of the Eskimos.

Q. What was the name of the soldier who was the first person to discover the approaching Japanese planes at Pearl Harbor? W. L. E.

A. His name was Joseph L. Lockard. In 1942 Lockard graduated from Officers' Candidate School, and received a commission as second lieutenant. He was released from active duty on Dec. 13, 1945, as a first lieutenant.

Q. Which of Stravinsky's compositions was received with such derision at its first playing that the performance was termed a scandal? N. T.

A. The reference is probably to Stravinsky's "Sacre du Printemps." The premiere, in May, 1913, was hissed by the Paris audience. The conductor could not hear the music. Debussy shouted for quiet and Diaghilev, the impresario, attempted to restore order by turning the lights off and on.

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MCKENNEY ON BRIDGE

I had an interesting visitor from the West Indies recently, L. E. Ashenheim of Kingston, Jamaica, president of the Jamaican Bridge Association. He went over our Master Point plan very carefully in order to establish it in Jamaica.

Mr. Ashenheim gave me to day's hand, which at first glance, especially with a club opening, does not seem to present much of a problem. Declarer should have six diamond tricks, three club tricks, a heart stopper and plenty of opportunity to establish the spades. But let's try to make it!

Declarer won the first trick with the ten of clubs in dummy, cashed the ace of clubs, and led a spade. East won this with the king and returned a club, which South won with the king. He led the jack of diamonds, overtaking in dummy and hoping for

a diamond break—but East had four to the ten.

Another line South might have tried: Win the first trick with the ten of clubs, play a diamond to the jack, go back to the ace of clubs, and run the rest of the diamonds. But he would have found himself in trouble for discards. East and West would make three tricks in the suit. South discarded from, and the ace and king of the other.

Mr. Ashenheim gave me his solution: After the ten of clubs holds the first trick, come over to the South hand with the jack of diamonds, play a small club to dummy's ace, and cash only four more diamonds, discarding a small club, a heart, and two spades. Now lead a spade from dummy. You have taken five diamond tricks and two club tricks, and at this point Mr.
