Q. Were bricks imported from Suffolk County, England, used in the building of the White House? K. B.

A. There is no record of the use of English brick in this connection. The White House is constructed of stone known as Virginia freestone, grey sandstone from the Aquia Quarries in Virginia, painted white.

Q. Is it possible for beneficial insects to change their habits after importation into the United States and to become harmful? A. D.

A. The Department of Agriculture says that in all cases where beneficial insects are imported from abroad, a careful study is first made of their habits to insure that only those that are strictly beneficial will be imported. All these insects that are brought in subsist and produce their young strictly upon other insects, and there is no possibility that they will become harmful through a change of habits whereby they would attack plants.

Q. Is the statement that deer are to be found in all the states but one correct? If so, what state has no deer? E. E. C.

A. The Fish and Wildlife Service says that Kansas is the one state having no deer in the wild state. What deer it has are confined in parks.

Q. What is the purpose of the vanes on the top of an autogiro? L. P. O.
