Q. Is snuff used to any extent, D. W.
A. Approximately 39,000,000 pounds of snuff were produced in 1946. Much of the snuff produced is consumed in the South and in areas that have large foreign-born populations.
Q. Where is the Road of Liberty? S. J. I.
A. The Road of Liberty is in France. It traces the course of the American forces in World War II, the essential idea being "grateful homage to the United States, to the American armies and particularly the Third Army" on the part of the French people. Road markers identify the cities and villages through which the Americans passed.
Q. Are the waves on the Great Lakes ever as high as those on the open ocean? L. E. Y.
A. Lake Superior has the largest waves, and it is probable that during severe storms waves of a height of from 20 to 25 feet may be encountered in deep water. In some parts of the ocean waves may reach twice this height.
Q. Was it Catherine the Great of Russia, or another European ruler who said that "gold and more gold" was necessary in order to wage war? E. N. L.
A. It was Catherine the Great who, when asked the three most important requirements for making war, replied, "Gold, more gold, and still more gold."
