ANSWERS TO QUESTIONS

Q. How long is the Ambassador Bridge in Detroit? R. E. R. A. The Ambassador Bridge has a channel span of 1850 feet, connecting the United States with Canada. This is the longest international suspension bridge in the world. Detroit also has the only international tube on earth, the Detroit-Windsor tunnel.

Q. Is there danger of bats becoming entangled in a woman's hair? P. R. A. This widespread belief is groundless. A bat that is flying about in close quarters may alight temporarily on a person's body. Its remarkable powers of perception, however, enable the bat to find its way accurately and it is far to clever to become entangled in anyone's hair.

Q. What is the total number of women judges in the United States at this time? M. J. E. A. There are 51 women judges serving in the United States, according to information prepared by the National Association of Women Lawyers. Three are federal judges.

Q. What is the composition of the so-called "bottle gas," such as butane, Shellane and Pyrofax? R. B. A. The Bureau of Mines says that bottled gases, commonly called L. TODAY'S hand presents a problem and a little humor. I received it from Ralph E. de Castro, New York advertising man. He held the East hand, his wife West.

After a good deal of pondering South bid six spades. When his wife in the West position doubled. De Castro started to figure that if the opponents made their contract, they would get 720 for tricks, 500 for a small slam, 50 for making the contract, 300 for game and they probably would have 150 honors—1720 points! He decided to make a stab in the dark.

Why did he bid seven diamonds instead of seven hearts? He says he cannot remember. He trumped the opening spade lead and then led a small diamond over to dummy's ace. South showing out. Next he led dummy's heart, finessed the queen, and again South showed out. He cashed the ace of hearts, discarded a club from dummy, then proceeded to ruff out hearts and spades. On the third spade North should have discarded the four of clubs, but instead he got mad and trumped with his good queen of diamonds. So East just discarded a club and went down only one.

He was explaining what a nice bid he had made when Mrs. de Castro scornfully said, "I would have set the contract because I would have taken two club tricks."

"You certainly would not," replied Mr. de Castro, "because he would have trumped your opening diamond lead. Then he would lead the king of clubs and you could not stop him from ruffing two clubs."

However, his wife had an answer for that. "I was not going to open a diamond—I intended to open a trump."

And so on far into the night. For my own comments, I would not recommend the spade bid, because if North held the ace of clubs, they ought to be able to make seven. Also, if North held the ace of hearts and ace of diamonds, and South opened with six, North probably would go to seven.

ISSUE LOOMS

The Gregorian calendar still falls by 26 seconds a year to coincide with sun time so in 3323 years it will be off a full day. Some scientists have recommended the introduction in the Gregorian system of a new corrective device. In addition to skipping leap year on centenary years, not divisible by four hundred, these scientists would skip extra days on centenary years that are divisible by four thousand. Such an additional correction would hold the calendar error down to one day in every 20 thousand years. It is an issue that must be met squarely before the year 4000 rolls around.—Denver Post.
