Bill Doudna's SPOTLIGHT Band Plays New Music

MUSIC: Next Sunday's program by the University of Wisconsin Concert band will introduce four works new to Madison audiences. Prof. Raymond F. Dvorak's organization will play two of them from manuscript.

Warren Zwicky, Oshkosh sophomore, will be soloist in Shostakovich's "Concerto for Piano," arranged for band by Dvorak. The other manuscript work will be Leo Sowerby's overture, "In Springtime," which will open the concert.

Other new works on the program will be William Grant Still's "From the Delta" and Ernest

Weber's "The Great Century," a concert march dedicated to the Wisconsin centennial. Still's composition is in three movements—"Work Song," "Spiritual," and "Dance."

The concert also will include two movements of Shostakovich's fifth symphony (which the Boston Symphony orchestra will play on ABC-WENR at 8:30 tonight); an extract from Tanneur's "Orestes," and Philip James "Festival March."

This, the band's 62nd annual Palm Sunday concert, will be presented at 4:15 p. m. in the Wisconsin Union theater. Tickets are on sale at the theater box office and by band members.

STAGE: Collette Slightam, whom Helen Matheson found praiseworthy in "Cradle Song" Sunday night, is the daughter of two Madison musicians. Her father, Francis, is a tenor heard often here, and her mother, Marjorie Brinkhoff Slightam, is an organist and pianist now appearing in Indianapolis.

"I Remember Mama," in which Charlotte Greenwood played here, will close its 43-week tour Apr. 5 in Denver. "Business has been sputtering," says the New York Tribune, "that the tour might have been extended, but it was decided to close because of the release of RKO's screen version."

Irra Petina, who starred in the Broadway company of "Song of Norway," probably will have a major role in a new Edwin Lester operetta, "Magdalena."

The longest-running musical show in American history will have its fifth birthday on Mar. 31. It's "Oklahoma!" which opened at the St. James theater the night of Mar. 31, 1943, and which has been there ever since. Its music is still on the best-seller lists and its ballet, by Agnes DeMille, started a new dance vogue.

AS of the fifth anniversary, "Oklahoma!" will have played 2,344 times at the St. James to a total audience of about 4,456,380. A second company has been touring the country four years, a U.S. group took the show to 1,500,000 members of the armed forces, and a London company is selling out months in advance. Incidentally, the touring company broke the all-time record for any touring show with a gross of \$119,118.50 for one week in Oklahoma City two years ago.

"Finian's Rainbow" has been produced in Prague under the title, "Magical Pot."

"Happy Birthdays," starring Helen Hayes, closed in New York last week after 563 performances.

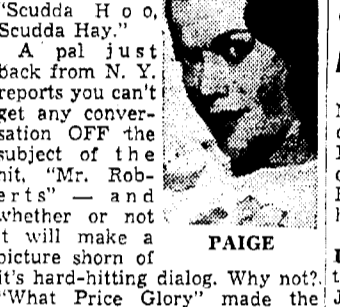
At the Metropolitan Opera, Kathleen Cornell will take her "Anthony and Cleopatra" on tour. It closed Saturday night after 126 New York showings.
