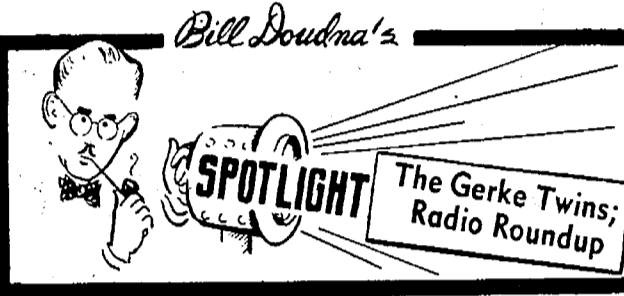


In Central Junior High Operetta

STORY: Frank Wiecek and a companion are sentenced to 99 years for the slaying of a policeman in 1932. Cop slayings were a dime a dozen that year so no one paid much attention to the case until 1944. What follows is the factual, or close to it, account of how McNeal's writings righted a miscarriage of justice.

HIGH POINTS: The filming of this true story—the actual men condemned were Joe Majczek and a companion—made in the back alleys and main streets of Chicago. . . . McNeal's prying into the case showing the routine but backbreaking job of a working newspaperman. . . . Hollywood's conception of the year, by letting a reporter act like a human being instead of the typed inebriated know-it-all who beats cops and murderers at their own game. . . . Kasia Orzawska's portrayal of the mother who never lost faith. . . .

LOW POINTS: The film fails to explain what happens to the other youth railroaded to prison as a cop-killer. . . . VERDICT: Adult entertainment which comes along much too seldom.
