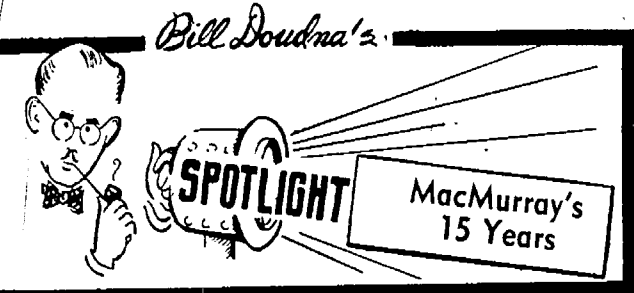


For Baby's First Easter

BEAVER DAM TO HOLLYWOOD: This is Fred MacMurray's 15th year in movies, and he has made it a busy one. The former Beaver Dam musician played his 50th screen role in "The Miracle of the Bells," appearing as a press agent. He's also in "Along Came Baby" with Paulette Goddard, Burgess Meredith, James Stewart, Henry Fonda, Dorothy Lamour, Victor Moore, and Harry James.

And now he has been announced as co-star, with Madeleine Carroll and Charles "Buddy" Rogers, in "An Innocent Affair," which goes into production soon under Lloyd Bacon's direction. MacMurray's first screen role after being an extra—was in "Car 99." Director Wesley Ruggles spotted him, and gave him the leading man's assignment in "The Gilded Lily," which starred Claudette Colbert.

Since then, he has played one leading role after another. Born in Kanakee, Ill., on Aug. 30, 1908, MacMurray lived there only a year before his parents moved to Beaver Dam, where Fred went to grade and high school. He attended Carroll college in Waukesha, playing a saxophone in dance bands to help with expenses.

Then came band work in Chicago and Hollywood, where he also worked as a film extra. He went to New York with a theater band, then joined a revue, "Three's a Crowd." After it closed its tour, he returned to California and worked in vaudeville. Returning to the East for vaudeville and night club dates, he landed a major role in "Roberta," where film scouts saw him and took him back to Hollywood.
