Polack Bros. Circus will return to Madison for the second annual Zor Shrine temple circus, to begin a six-day engagement, starting Monday at 8:15 p. m. in the Parkway theater.

There won't be any sawdust underfoot, nor will there be any tinsel poles to sit behind, so audiences will see their circus free of obstructions when the 2 1/2 hour performance, consisting of 35 attractions, is presented.

One Act at a Time With few exceptions the displays are presented one act at a time, and these advantages more than compensate for the absence of the traditional white-top, its backers say.

This year's presentation features many European artists, some of them making their initial American debut here. Among the foreign novelties with the circus are the Five Ericsons, champion Swedish athletes, a feat of strength and equilibrium in their routines: Rio and Irma, sensational Latin unsupported ladder experts; Conchita Morales, Mexico's darling of the air who swings by her teeth from great heights, and the Ivanovs, Bulgarian tight-wire artists.

Bill Douma's SPOTLIGHT Casadesus at the Piano

AT THE UNION: Robert Casadesus is paying his third quadrennial visit to Madison, playing a piano with almost encyclopedic skill and with an encyclopedic for interpretation.

The great French pianist performed for an audience of almost 1,300 at the Wisconsin Union theater Friday night and will play again at 8 tonight for one which should be as large.

A few seats were left when the boxoffice opened today, but when the word gets around about Friday night's program these should go in a hurry.

A perfectionist in his technical approach to piano playing, Casadesus at the same time is a connoisseur of the poetry of music; he has warmed his approach to the audience, thawing the cold formality which was something of a barrier between him and many of his listeners in other years.

Casadesus' program opened with a group of short works by Rameau, in which he made the piano sound a bit like the instrument for which Rameau wrote—the harpsichord.

The picturesque pieces were laced with attractive melodies, which the pianist traced clearly and lightly.

Next was Schumann's monument to musical variety, "Carnaval"—a highly colored picture of a mask ball, with scenes of dancing and caricatures and portraits of participants.

To this Casadesus gave all his skill at imagery, with a virile production of the finale—which Schumann intended as an attack on his contemporary musical fads.

After the intermission came three Chopin works—the "Ballade" in G minor, first of the series of four; "Berceuse, Opus 57," and "Tarentelle, Opus 43."

These were probably the high points of the program, for in their comparatively brief span they gave Casadesus the opportunity of displaying his uncanny speed, and his poetic feeling. Besides, these are great pieces of piano music.

Three études by the artist emphasized his touch of sky humor; slight and light, they're fun to hear and most interesting to a pianist.

Raur's seventh "Nocturne," and Chabrier's "Bourree Fantastique" closed the program with splashes of brilliance.
