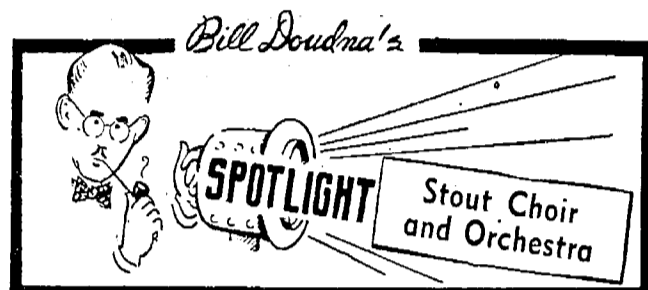


Smiley's in Town

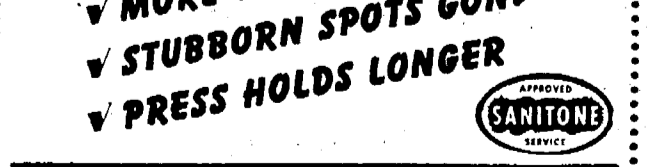
