

McKENNEY ON BRIDGE

BRIDGE moves in cycles. B Twenty years ago my col-umn carried nothing but auction. Looking back through the columns I find that I advocated the Bryant McCampbell pitch count, made popular at that time by Milton C. Work and R. R. Rich-

This pitch count has been used by some bridge players for the by some bridge players for the past 20 years. A few years ago Charles H. Goren incorporated it in a book he wrote, without making any claim of originality. Now it is interesting to find some local authorities claiming to be originators of something that was in use before they played bridge.

The McCampbell count is as follows:

follows:

Ace4 points
King3 points
Queen2 points
Jack1 point

Jack1 point
Two ten-spots equal a jack.
Most modern experts agree on
the following count for an original bid: For one no trump you
must have from 16 to 19 points,
for an original bid of two no
trump you must have 22 to
24 points, for an original bid
of three no trump 25 to 27
points with more than 27
points open either with a twobid or four no trump.
Note that there is a blank

spot between the one and two no
trump bids. When you have a
count of 20 or 21, you must
open with a suit bid. For example you might have a four-card
heart suit, in which case you
bid a heart. If your partner bids
a spade you bid two no trump,
which tells your partner that
you have an "in-between" hand.
In response to an original one
no trump bid partner raises to
two no trump with a count of
8 or 9, or with a count of 7 and
a five-card suit. With a count of
10 to 14 raise to three no trump.
A total count of 33 or 34
should produce a small slam,
while a total count of 37 or 38
should produce a grand slam.
