**Bill Doukna's SPOTLIGHT Haresfoot Alumni**

While present members of the Haresfoot club will hold the spotlight most of the week of Apr. 26, alumni will be the focal point on Saturday, May 1. On that day, the University of Wisconsin club will hold its 50th anniversary reunion.

Famed Haresfooters of the past have been invited to attend the festivities. Fredric March, best known of all the alumni in the theatrical world, can't make it because of picture commitments, but Herbert Stothart, composer, may come.

The reunion will begin with the May 1 matinee. The alumni will have a rehearsal room at the Wisconsin Union theater available for reminiscing sessions, and will be permitted to roam around backstage and talk with the cast of "Big As Life."

Between matinee and night performances, the alumni will dine on the stage of the theater with the 148 cast and chorus as their guests. Then they will attend the night performance, sitting in a special block of seats. Afterward there will be a buffet supper at the Madison club.

A special committee will provide entertainment for visiting alumni's wives.

The club has invited the alumni to attend its annual initiation banquet Sunday, May 2.

The Haresfoot lads, who were to leave late today on their 7-city tour, have promised a Hollywood-

style opening for the first Madison performance of "Big As Life" on Monday, Apr. 26. Newspaper cameramen and radio announcers will be in Wisconsin Union theater lobby when the first-nighters arrive.

Before World War II, Haresfoot's opening night was an occasion for formal dress. That practice was dropped, but it will be resumed in part this season. Announcements say that "formal dress for opening night is optional."

Guests invited to attend the opening include Gov. Rennebohm, Pres. Fred, Dean Paul L. Trump, and Director Porter Butts of the Memorial Union—who once was a Haresfoot "leading lady."

There was plenty of corn on the Orpheum theater stage Wednesday, and the overflow audience loved it.

Russ Morgan, the former Scranton, Pa. coal-miner, displayed his 3-way talent with trombone, piano, and a pleasant voice playing and singing in his exciting but easy-to-take style.

Morgan is an old-timer when it comes to showmanship, and his unbuttoned-vest brand of wisecracks and running patter is the backbone of his show.

Al Jennings, one of the 15-piece band's trombones, sang a couple of novelty tunes—"Somebody Is Taking My Place," "Sweet Eloise," and, of course, his theme, "Does You Hear Beat For Me?"

Morgan's big, sweet band will open at the Biltmore in Los Angeles late in May, for a lush, 5-year contract—just another indication of the public's trend from loud swing bands toward more restrained styles.

Stage performers include Phillips and Clayton, a skilful acrobatic dance team, and Barney Grant, a funnier-than-most hill-billy comedian.
