

The Department of the Army emphasized that language-area students must be volunteers who are fully qualified in their basic arm of service and quali-fied for general staff duties; they must not have reached their 31st birthday, must be officers of the Regular Army, have a proven aptitude for languages and an efficiency rating indica-tive of high performance of duty in general staff assignments. Straight language students must in general staff assignments. Straight language students must be younger than 36 years of age, have a proven aptitude for lan-guages, be in the Regular Army or Category I, and have an ef-ficiency rating indicative of high performance of duty in future assignments.




