McKENNEY ON BRIDGE

IT WAS back in 1931 that Mrs. P. Hal (Dorothy) Sims sold me the idea of running an individual tournament in which each player would play with every other player as a partner once and as an opponent twice.

Today's hand is one that helped Becker win. I believe he was the only player in the room to get to four hearts.

Over East's two-club bid Becker did not bid two hearts, but three hearts. When West went to four clubs and North passed, you might say Becker was stretching to bid four

hearts. But he said North's pass indicated he should bid four hearts or double four clubs. West cashed the ace of hearts and continued with a heart. Becker realized the spades had to break three-three; or if the spades broke four-two he had to hope that the hand with four spades did not have the extra trump.

He cashed the ace and king of spades, and East was in on the third round. East cashed the king of clubs, but when he continued with the queen Becker ruffed. Now, of course, he did not even have to ruff a spade. He picked up the other trump and claimed the balance of the tricks.

ANSWERS TO QUESTIONS

Q. Who was the first Indian killed in World War II? P. R. O. A. The first Indian to give his life was Henry Nolataby, a Chickasaw on the U. S. S. Arizona. He died fighting at Pearl Harbor.

Q. What was the depth of the snow that fell during the New York blizzard of 1888? F. McN. A. In the famous blizzard of March 11-14, 1888, it was estimated that about 40 inches of snow fell. In many places in the city snow drifted to a depth of from 10 to 15 feet.

Q. Is the widow of a World War II veteran eligible for Social Security benefits? R. V. D. A. The widow and children of a veteran who died within three years after his discharge from the armed forces may be eligible for benefits. She should present her case to the nearest Social Security office.

Q. How old is the Quartermaster Corps? C. V. R. A. The Corps was founded on June 16, 1775. The Quartermaster Corps is responsible for procuring and distributing to the armed forces more than 70,000 individual items.

Q. Who wrote the inscription, "Equal Justice Under Law," that appears on the front of the Supreme Court Building in Washington, D. C.? P. H. A. The inscription was written by Charles Evans Hughes.

Q. How many cities were there in the United States in 1790? H. K. A. Of the 998 incorporated places reported by the Census of 1940, only 53 were reported in 1790. Almost half—26, were in Massachusetts. The largest, then as now, was New York City with over 30,000. Philadelphia was second, 10,000. Charleston, S. C., fourth, 4,000. Baltimore, Md., fifth, 3,000. The smallest reported was Louisville, Ky., with 200.

Q. What is the greatest number of bulls to have been killed by a matador in bullfighting? I. R. S. A. One of Spain's champion matadors, who died recently, had slain 5000 bulls, a figure which is regarded as a world record.

Q. What annuals should be grown for a fragrant garden? J. B. A. Nicotiana, sweet alyssum, petunia, stock, heliotrope, mimosa, sweet pea, nasturtium.

Q. What languages besides Spanish are spoken in the Latin American countries? M. A. M. A. Eighteen of the 20 countries employ the Spanish language. Brazilians speak Portuguese and Haitians, French.

Q. Did many persons from the Confederate states emigrate to South America after the end of the Civil War? O. D. M. A. At the close of the Civil War some 10,000 people from the southern states journeyed to various Latin-American countries. Between 3000 and 4000 of these emigrants established homes in Brazil.

Q. Who is known as the King of the Hoboes? J. L. T. A. Jeff Davis is known as the "King of the Hoboes." Davis has traveled more than 1,800,000 miles in a happy-go-lucky style, and some 45,000 miles as a paid passenger.
