Crosby Still May Make Film in Erin

By EDITH GWYNN HOLLYWOOD — Bing Crosby wants to do a picture in Ireland this summer, namely, "Needle in the Haystack," and now it looks as though he'd turn down a deal with Arthur Rank to star in "Brigadoon" in favor of his original plan. If he goes (and he now has Paramount's permission to produce one picture of his own each year), he'd use the famous Abbey Theater Players of Dublin in this film. Meanwhile his music, Bob Hope has mixed the idea of playing Joe Miller of jokebook fame for Arthur Rank—but he will trek overseas to do a picture for him sooner or later. Cheer up—there'll be more "Road" pictures co-starring Hope and Crosby—because they're too popular and too much of a mint to be discarded.

Four hundred singers from at east 17 Madison churches will be in the massed choir which will present a Hymn Festival at 8 p. m. Sunday in Luther Memorial church. Prof. E. B. Gordon will conduct the huge chorus, with Ruth Pilger Andrews as accompanist.

TITLE: The Bishop's Wife. TYPE: Comedy. CAST: Cary Grant, Loretta Young, David Niven, Monty Woolley, and James Gleason. REVIEWER: Jean Behling. STORY: The bishop (Niven) has grown away from his wife (Young) and daughter trying to build his great monument, a cathedral. When everything seems to be going wrong, he prays for help—and Angel Dudley (Grant) appears. Grant and Young romp through the rest of the film. Grant working miracles occasionally, and Niven "comes back to his people"—and his wife. Angel Grant's work is done, so he disappears to heavenly music.

LOW POINTS: Niven, he never quite relaxes enough to make supposed scenes of endearment human; you don't feel he's ever been young or had any fun.

HIGH POINTS: The utter fantasy of the story... Grant's lively air of well-being... the Mitchell Boy choir... Woolley's portrayal of a professor who finally starts to write his history book via Grant's miracles... Gleason, the cab driver, completely charming, as usual... a beautifully staged skating number... Grant as the angel.

VERDICT: Well worth seeing.
