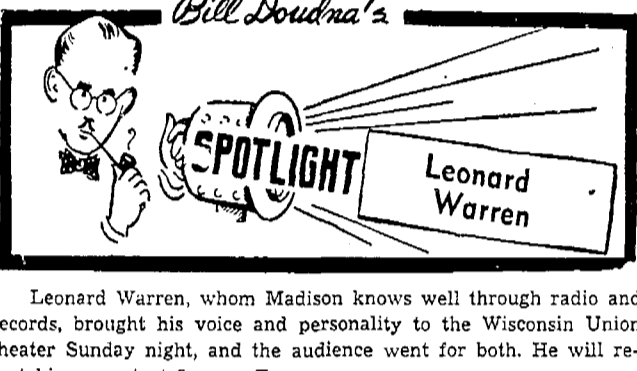

Leonard Warren, whom Madison knows well through radio and records, brought his voice and personality to the Wisconsin Union theater Sunday night, and the audience went for both. He will repeat his concert at 8 p. m. Tuesday in the same auditorium.

Regarded by Eastern critics as one of the great baritone voices of the Metropolitan Opera, Warren has a vigorous, vivid voice, a gracious manner, and a great enthusiasm for his singing. The care which he gives each note and word, the apparent delight he takes in encores, and the way in which he extracts the full flavor of meaning from his arias reflect this trait.

And Warren was best in his operatic excerpts. He sang "Eri Tu," from "The Masked Ball," the "Toreador Song" from "Carmen" (this was an encore); "L'Avant de Quitter Ces Lieux," from "Faust," and "Largo al Factotum," from "The Barber of Seville." The audience liked him best in these, too, so it was strange to find him turning to light, familiar songs for his last encores.

He opened his program with "Ombra Mai Fu" — the popular "Largo" — from Handel's "Xerxes," a true test of a singer's intonation, a test which Warren passed easily. The flowing "Seben Crudele" by Caldara was next, followed by Handel's "O Rudder Than the Cherry," full of the runs in which the composer delighted and to which Warren gave an exact reading.

The second group, composed of French music, showed more facets of Warren's versatility — lightness, in "Les Berceaux," jollity, in "Chanson a Boire," sweetness, in "D'Indy's "Madrigal," and religious feeling and an affection for melody in Bizet's "Agnus Dei."

Then came a sterling performance of "Eri Tu," with "Toreador" as an encore — and Warren made Esclamillo a confessed braggart by his acting, in both voice and gesture. The "Faust" aria was smooth yet virile, and "Largo al Factotum" got as near a "straight" treatment as is possible without slighting its inherent humor. Warren made no special point of speed, and used none of the tricks which many baritone singers inject. And by this time an earlier fuzz had disappeared from his high pianissimo.

The concert ended with two English chantes — sea songs of contrasting style — which Warren recently recorded. The group also included Bridge's "Oh, That It Were So" and "Everything That I Can Spy," by Bone and Fenton. Final encores were "A Little Bit of Heaven," "Danny Boy," and "The Lord's Prayer."
