
GENERALLY speaking, bridge

players in the United States have contented themselves with bridge books by American authors. Recently, however, several interesting bridge books have come from England. I have just looked over one by Terence Reese of England entitled Reese of England entitled "Reese on Play." It is a book on the play of the hand that I can recommend highly to any-one who wants to improve his

For today's lesson hand I have taken a safety play given in Mr. Reese's book. When the opening lead of the king of dia-monds holds, West shifts to the queen of clubs.

Looking at both hands, it is

obvious that declarer has two losing spaces. He already has lost a diamond and must lose a



club trick. How can he condense his four losers into three? First of all he must win the first club trick in dummy with the ace. If he does not East can overtake the queen with the king and lead through the

spades.

Declarer's next play should be the ten of diamonds, discarding the six of clubs from his own hand. West will win this trick with the jack and lead another club. South trumps, then leads the ace and a small trump. On dummy's nine of diamonds he discards the three of spades, and this establishes the eight of diamonds for the discard of the

queen of spades.

What actually happens is that on the ten, nine and eight of diamonds declarer discards three losers. But only two of those tricks are real losers be-cause one of them becomes established for the trick needed to make the contract,


