SNYDER, Tex. (U.P.)—A dream of oil in his own back yard has come true for Jackson Ellis, his wife and his five sons. Twenty years ago a geologist told Ellis that there was oil on the farm. Ellis kept it in mind but lacked the means to do anything about it.

When four of his sons returned home after World War II, the father interested them in his dream. Using their own equipment in a co-operative effort, the sons—Jackson, Melvin, Leo, Othel and Ather—drilled a 1,750-foot well and completed it for a daily potential of 165 barrels.

UW Group to Greet Norse Monday

Radio Program Will Honor Their Independence Day

In recognition of the national day of Norwegian independence, May 17, the faculty and students of the University of Wisconsin department of Scandinavian languages have written and transcribed a half-hour radio program which will be broadcast over the Norwegian radio network during the evening of the national holiday Monday.

It is the first time a Norwegian radio program has originated in Madison, declared Einar Haugen, professor of Scandinavian languages at the university.

Assisting him was Tormod Skagstad, student assistant, and a number of students from the department.

The program was transcribed at state radio station WHA and the record airmailed to Montreal, Canada, where it was beamed to Oslo for recording.

The program consists of a scene from a class in the Norwegian language at the university, with typical classroom discussion, the singing of Norwegian songs, conversation between students and instructor, comments by Norwegian students who are studying at Wisconsin, a greeting to Norway from the university, a violin solo by Gunnar Saevig, a student from Norway on the Wisconsin campus, and poetry readings by Bjorn Anderson and Skagstad.

The Wisconsin Scandinavian department was selected to prepare the program by the Norwegian State Broadcasting system. The department is the oldest in the nation, having taught the Scandinavian languages for 78 years.
