Q. How long has the Institute for Advanced Study at Princeton, N. J., been in existence? D. I. N.

A. The institute was founded in 1930 by Louis Brumberger and Mrs. Felix Fuld to provide the country with a place where scientists and scholars could devote themselves to serious research and at the same time train competent post-graduate students.

Q. A record of 103 ballots was required to break the deadlock between Smith and McAdoo, Democratic candidates at the National Convention of 1924. What is the record for a Republican convention? H. B. D.

A. Since the Civil War the highest number of ballots required to nominate in a Republican convention was 36 in 1880, when Garfield was nominated after a deadlock between the supporters of Grant, Blaine and Sherman.

Q. When and by whom was a speed of 100 miles per hour first attained in an automobile race at Indianapolis Speedway? J. D. A.

A. Peter De Paolo was the first man to average over 100 m. p. h. when he won the race in 1925.

Q. Please give a list of a few unusual monuments abroad such as the one to cheese in France? E. S.

A. At Mont St. Michel, Brittany, there is a monument to an omelette; at Plymouth, England, there is one to a pig; at Andernach, Germany, to a name of cards (skat); at Cobham, Kent, one commemorates a man's toe; while at Llandudno, Wales, in memory of Lewis Carroll, there is a statue of the famous White Rabbit.

Q. The painter's name, Bruegel, is spelled in different ways. How did the artist spell it? M. C. G.

A. Jean Vriensche writes: "From 1551 to 1559, the period of the drawings and the engravings, the painter wrote his name: Brueghel. In 1559, the orthography Bruegel appeared at the same time as his first paintings. . . . From 1559 to his death, the ten most important years of Bruegel's life, he is faithful to the new signature."
