Fighting General to Be Here

Gen. Gavin, 82nd Chief, to View Parade

The man who commanded the famous 82nd Airborne division through the toughest fighting in Europe in World War II will be in Madison on Saturday. He is Maj. Gen. James M. Gavin, U.S. Army, now chief of staff for the Fifth Army.

With other visiting dignitaries, Gen. Gavin will review the Statehood Day parade at 11 a. m. from the reviewing stand on Monona ave.

He will be introduced to the public along with other special guests during the evening show at Camp Randall where, at 7 p. m., Statehood Day will wind up its festivities in a gigantic performance of music, pageantry, historical tableaux, and song.

Up From Ranks
Though only 41 years old, Gen. Gavin has 23 years of military service to his credit—years crowded with study, travel, and the dangers of modern warfare.

Indicative of his success are the two stars that mark his rank.

They tell the story of a man who served in the army as a private in 1925, who went on to graduate from the United States military academy at West Point with a bachelor of science degree and a commission as second lieutenant, infantry, in 1929, and who went straight up the promotion ladder to become a major general in 1944.

When Gen. Gavin became commanding officer of the 505th parachute infantry in 1942 and remained its commander when it was assigned to the 82nd Airborne division in 1943, he brought good training with him.

In the years between graduation from West Point and this assignment, he had attended infantry school at Fort Benning, Ga., served with the 57th infantry (Philippine Scouts) at Ft. William McKinley, P.I., attended parachute school, and the command and general staff school at Ft. Leavenworth, Kas.

Led Sicily Assault
The 505th Parachute combat team under the command of Gen. Gavin (then a colonel), a part of the 82nd Airborne division, spearheaded the assault on Sicily in July, 1943. In 1944 the division had been relieved from the Normandy front and returned to England. It was there that Gen. Gavin assumed command of the entire division.

Gen. Gavin wears six campaign stars that tell the story of his and the 82nd Airborne division's contributions to the victory. The spearhead represents the invasions of Sicily, Naples-Foggia, Normandy, Rhineland, Ardennes counter-offensive ("Battle of the Bulge"), and Central Germany.

The four combat jumps in the European Theatre were in Sicily, Italy, Normandy, and Holland.

Fought at Anzio
The division fought as regular infantry troops at the Anzio beach-head and during the Battle of the Bulge. The importance of their service can be read in the Presidential Unit citations on their chests.
