Legion, VFW Set Saturday Goal of 'Poppy on Every Coat'

"A poppy on every coat" — remembrance in every heart. This is the goal of several hundred workers who will represent the Madison American Legion and Veterans of Foreign Wars posts when Poppy Day is observed here Saturday.

All proceeds from the sale of the poppies will be used for child welfare and veterans rehabilitation. Plans for Poppy Day have been made by a joint committee of the two veterans organizations headed by Clarence Skinner, Ralph Pearson, and Donald L. Cowan, co-chairmen.

Because they grew "between the crosses, in a row" in World War I battle cemeteries, poppies have become the memorial flower for the war dead. In addition to services made possible through Poppy Day sale funds, the flowers perform another valuable task for many disabled veterans, the Poppy Day committee pointed out.

The flowers are made by disabled veterans, which enables them to earn some money, and helps occupy long hours of convalescence and hospitalization.
