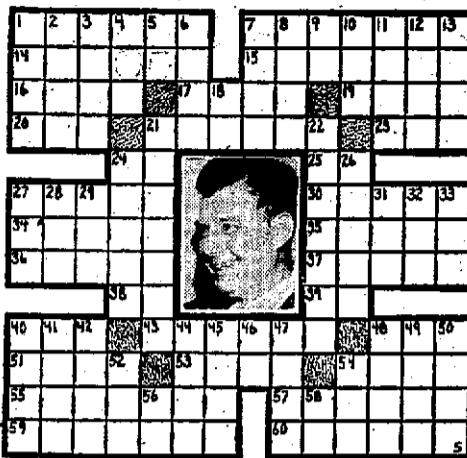
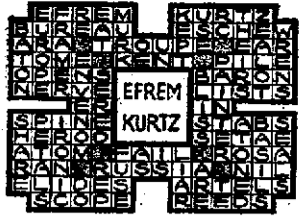

Q. Why is television broadcasting more complicated than radio broadcasting?—H. H.
A. One reason that is more complex is that the short waves used in television travel in an amazingly straight line. Since the earth curves, reception is possible for only a short distance. By locating the antenna at a great height, however, a station can cover a radius of 50 to 75 miles.

Q. Are all animals natural swimmers?—I. D. E.
A. Nearly all animals can swim when forced into water, although some aren't very skillful swimmers. The giant tortoise and the old world chameleon are examples of animals that are unable to swim.

Q. What is the largest quantity of cotton normally produced per acre?—C. W. W.
A. The Department of Agriculture says that 2 1/2 bales per acre is very good in any cotton area and has been grown in the eastern part of the United States. Three bales per acre is not uncommon in California. The De Shafter, Calif., produced 60 bales on 20 acres.
