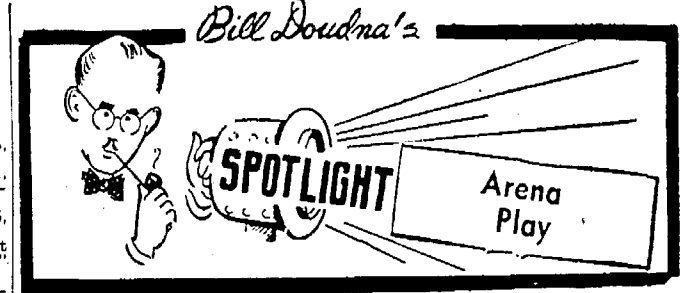

Handicapped by inadequate acoustics and absence of some properties, the Lawrence college players of Appleton gave a convincing demonstration of the value of arena play production here Thursday.

Under the direction of John F. Sollers of the Lawrence college theater, the cast presented "You Touched Me" in Great hall of the Memorial Union as part of the third annual Wisconsin Idea Theater conference.

In the arena setup, the "stage" was merely a section of Great hall's floor space equipped with the proper furniture and a slightly elevated section representing an upstairs room.

Vacation Bible School Opened in Ridgeway. RIDGEWAY—Grace Methodist church's daily vacation Bible school opened in Ridgeway this week.

While attention was centered Thursday on direction and manner, because of the nature of the audience, the production was successful in large measure by the competence of the cast.

Patricia Foley was outstanding as a selfish spinster determined to preserve her home as she wanted it against all odds—these odds being a drunken brother who really owned the home, and his unofficially-adopted son, in love with his unofficial foster-sister.

Bruce Campbell was top-notch, too, as a smug rector. William Munchow won plenty of laughs with his characterization of the alcoholic, for whom he won sympathy through emphasis on his sense of humor rather than more obvious means.

John Fillion was sincere and completely real as the foster-son, and Mary Lamers gave a good portrayal of the girl completely dominated by her aunt, although her last-minute rebellion lacked the force that would have made it more credible.

The hall's acoustics interfered with Munchow's and Fillion's projection of their lines at times, but the others were almost always completely audible to the whole audience, no matter what their stage positions.

Sollers' direction showed an acute appreciation of the difficulties of arena production—and at the same time an understanding of its greatest advantage, a more nearly complete unity of actors and audience than is possible from a stage.

The conference continued today with discussions of theatrical techniques, which will occupy most of Saturday's program, too. Barret H. Clark, nationally famous leader in the little theater movement, will give a public

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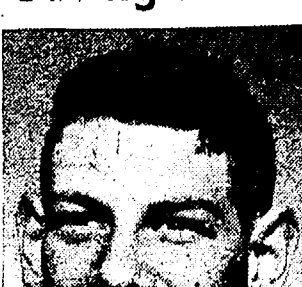

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Mineral Point Boy Scout to Get Merit Award for Saving a Life

MINERAL POINT—Paul Fine, 18, Mineral Point Boy Scout, will receive a certificate of merit from the national court of honor of the Boy Scouts of America for saving the life of a guest at his home, it was announced Thursday night by Dr. George J. Fisher, national scout commissioner.

Fine will receive the award at Mineral Point. A total of 18 Boy Scouts and two Cub Scouts who saved the lives of others also will receive awards in their home communities.

Fine, according to the official scout citation, saved R. Postl, a guest at his home, from bleeding to death last Oct. 28. His father heard screams coming from Postl's room at 3 a. m. and found his guest running around his room seeking the light switch.

"The father put on the lights and found blood spurting from the visitor's arm and the floor covered with pools of blood. The guest evidently had put his arm through a window in his sleep and cut an artery.

"Fine was unable to stop the blood flow. His son arrived, calmed the guest, and applied a tourniquet using a towel tightened by a hairbrush handle. A physician praised the scout's first aid."

Ripon College Head Seriously Injured as Autos Sideswipe

MILWAUKEE—(U.P.)—The 40-year-old president of Ripon college was in "poor" condition here today after narrowly escaping death in an auto collision.

Dr. Clark C. Kuebler was taken to the County General hospital Thursday afternoon, after his car and another automobile sideswiped and overturned on Highway 100.

Dr. Kuebler, who was feared to have suffered a possible skull fracture, was still conscious when sheriff's deputies arrived at the scene of the accident. He told them he had been driving about 50 miles an hour, which was within the legal speed limit. He was alone in the car.

The other car was driven by Samuel W. Young, Hales Corners, Wis. Young said he had stopped for an arterial sign just before he turned onto the highway. He and Mrs. Arnold Peterson.

Judge Halts Hearing on Hospital Bond Issue in Lafayette

DARLINGTON—After an hour-long argument by attorneys, Circuit Judge A. W. Kopp halted a hearing on the \$100,000 Lafayette county hospital bond issue in circuit court at Darlington Thursday and gave attorneys a week in which to file briefs.

Judge Kopp advised attorneys to agree on hearing all questions in the case at one time.

To Compel Issuance. The action started Thursday by Atty. Wilfred Boyle was to compel the county to issue the bonds voted by the county board in January, but upon agreement by attorneys the question of the bonds' and whether a referendum is to be called, will be decided at the same time.

The court gave the attorneys 5 days, to file briefs in the case and the defense 2 days to reply.

Defendants in the case are W. H. Ayers, county board chairman, and Holmes Stott, county clerk, as representatives of the county.

Issue Termined Illegal. The bond issue has been termed illegal by the attorney general. Petitions calling for a referendum, signed by more than 10 per cent of the county voters, have asked a referendum.

The proposed hospital, which would cost about \$300,000, would be constructed in Darlington.

The Lafayette County Memorial Hospital assn. has raised a third of the amount and the federal government has indicated it would contribute a not h e r \$100,000.

Co-Op's Counsel Can't Cooperate; He's On Other Side

ALMA—(U.P.)—The Mondovi Cooperative assn. was a sad group today after their court champion decided to play ball in a rival league.

It all started when a number of co-ops protested taxes paid to the motor fuel division. Mondovi's group was selected as the test case before Circuit Judge Kenneth White.

The legal dispute was over the amount of shrinkage in fuel oil from the time of shipment to time of sale. The state allows 1 per cent, while the co-ops held out for 3 per cent.

The co-op's lawyer was a Mondovi attorney, also a former district attorney. After two days of testimony the case was postponed to July 8, but the co-op was confident that it had the upper hand with its able lawyer. Two assistant attorney generals defended the state.

But today the Co-op had lost some of its confidence. Co-op Counsel Grover Broadfoot has been "drafted by the enemy."

He recently was named by Gov. Neumann to the attorney general's position.
