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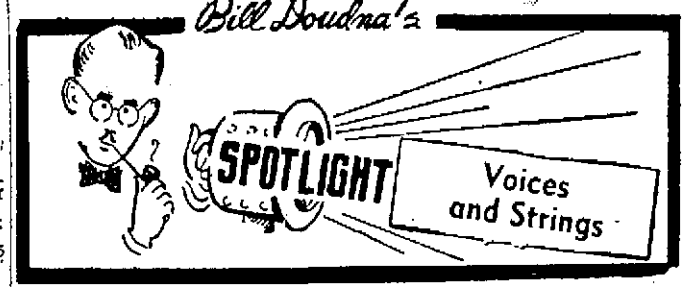

Songs from and about Scandinavia rang out in East high school auditorium Tuesday night when the Grieg Male chorus gave a concert for the benefit of The State Journal's Empty Stocking club and the Capital Times' Kiddie camp. An audience of only 400 turned out to hear the 30-voice chorus—and to help the youngsters with their admission fees. The Harps of Harmony, Madison trio, assisted the chorus. Natty dressed in white-and-blue uniforms, traditional summer wear of Scandinavian choruses, the men of the Grieg group saluted the 105th anniversary of the birth of Edvard Grieg with a reverent rendition of his setting of "The Great White Host" and his "Landsighting." Conductor Alexius Baas paced the latter so slowly that it lost much of its vivacity. Osvald Bernsen, baritone, was soloist in the Grieg works and in Fausen's "Norway, My Norway." He sang with complete sympathy, his voice echoing the love for Norway's traditions which had brought the chorus into being. On the whole, the group maintained an even balance. The main tenor section had one unidentified voice that sounded like it had solo possibilities. A faster tempo in some of the numbers would have helped the concert immeasurably, for when the chorus sang a rollicking Norwegian waltz as an encore it was at its best in every respect—intonation, enunciation, and attack and release. The harps added a touch of liveliness, too, with the sparkling "Amariyllis" gavotte, the tenderly humorous "Little King of Yvetot," and the picture-painting "In an 18th-Century Drawing Room."
