**DISCS OF THE DAY:** On the popular side... \* Xavier Cugat (Columbia): "Charisse," vocal by Bob Graham, and "On an Island With You"... "Charisse" goes heavy on the dramatizing, "Island" is a slow bolero... \* Kay Thompson and Williams Brothers (Columbia): "Louisiana Purchase" and "I See Your Face Before Me"... For those who have seen the act, this should be great stuff... if they doesn't go, they shouldn't go anywhere.

\* Benny Goodman and Peggy Lee (Columbia): "Somebody Else Is Taking My Place" and "Why Don't You Do Right?"... Once good, these still are... \* Doris Day (Columbia): "It's Magic" and "Put 'Em in a Box," with George Strain's orchestra... This "box" number gets better with time, but the arranger went too far here.

\* Tony Martin (Victor): "Begin the Beguine" and "My Sin," with Earl Hagen's orchestra... Choice Martin vocalizing on a pair of revivals... \* Jose Curbelo, orchestra (Victor): "Rumba Rumbero," vocal by Tito Rodriguez, and "Poinciana," vocal by Jose Duval... Duval does the better singing.

**DISCS OF THE DAY:** Recommended recordings... \* Maggie Teyte (Victor): "French Operatic Arias"... Here is a singer whose manner and sympathy with music make you think her voice is a few shades better than it really is, and it's good. These arias are from old operas by Pergolesi, Monsigny, Gretry, and Dourlen. Jean Paul Morel conducts the Victor orchestra... \* Polyna Stoska (Columbia): "Opera Arias," with Max Rudolf conducting the Metropolitan Opera orchestra... Miss Stoska has a fresh, agreeable voice. While it lacks warmth, its other features make up for that. The album includes the first recording of "Let Us Be Friends Again," from Strauss' "Ariadne auf Naxos." The other choices are "Marietta's Lute Song," from Korngold's "The Dead City," and the prayer, love dream, and love-awakening from Weber's "Der Freischutz." Recording and accompaniment are of the late date.

\* Dorothy Maynor (Victor): "Der Hirt auf dem Felsen," Schubert, with clarinet obligato by David Oppenheim... A lovely, warm performance. The clarinet role is played purely, as is George Schick's piano accompaniment. Ker... bd ttbe8D Rqhe

## Independents Hit Allocation of Fuel Oil, Gas

WASHINGTON—(U.P.)—Opposition to an industry plan for allocating fuel oil and gasoline was expected today from independent refiners, wholesalers and dealers with Sen. Kenneth Wherry (R-Neb.) on their side. The arguments were expected to come up at an interior department public hearing on the plan which is designed to keep fuel oil and gasoline flowing to essential users and overcome consumer hardship in case of shortages. It was learned that Wherry, chairman of the senate small business committee, has opposed the plan in a letter to Secretary of Interior J. A. Krug. He said the plan is aimed at alleviating hardship shortages only at the consumer level and won't take care of the independents.

## 'Had Enough of Poor Roads,' Hillsboro Protests to Governor

HILLSBORO—Hillsboro "has had enough" of poor roads, its businessmen have warned Gov. Rennebohm in two letters protesting his decision to blacktop Highway 33 between Union Center and Wonewoc. They fear the move might prevent laying cement on this part of the road. The letters were sent by the Hillsboro Lion's club and a committee of the Chamber of Commerce. "Backward Movement" The plan to blacktop the strip "is a backward movement," the Lions told the governor. "And it would cause material injury to all who call this region their home," they added. The club traced the history of the highway, routed through Hillsboro 33 years ago through the interest of the Hillsboro Commercial assn. "The Lions' letter was signed by R. D. Sandman, president, and Raymond Knowler, secretary. "Enough of Poor Roads" Hillsboro attracts more trucking than many cities that have cement highways, the Chamber of Commerce declared. "We have had enough of poor roads that break up every spring and cause untold expense to repair," the letter said. "We are prepared to go before the commercial groups of every community that must rely on Highway 33 as a major transportation highway to enlist their support to advocate that as good a surface be given Highway 33 as has been given to eastern communities," it warned. The chamber of Commerce letter was signed by H. R. Knowler, president.

## Cheese Plant Lost in Knowlton Fire

KNOWLTON—(U.P.)—Some 6,000 pounds of cheese was all that remained today out of a \$32,000 factory that was destroyed by fire. The Knowlton Cheese plant, operated by the Standard Brands Co., Green Bay, went up in smoke and flames early Thursday morning despite a two-hour battle by firemen from two towns. Manager Bernard Hopfensperger, who estimated the damage, said some 3,000 pounds of cheddar cheese was lost, in addition to the one-story frame and cinder block building. The blaze apparently was caused by overloading electric lines.
