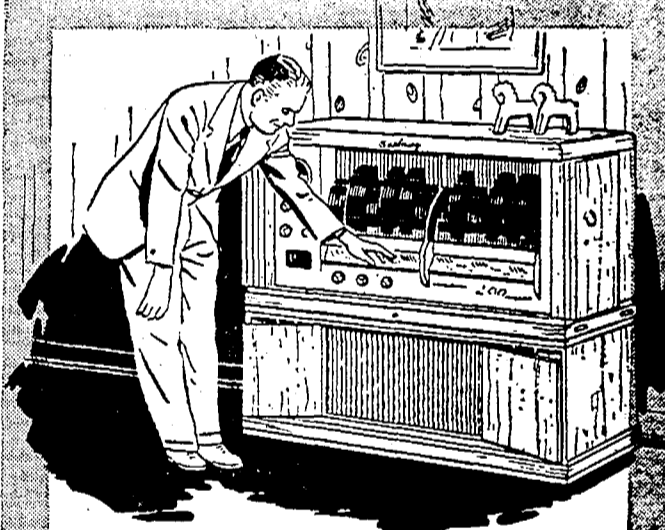

Tests Show Bats Not All Warm-Blooded SAN FRANCISCO—(U.P.)—All mammals are not consistently warm-blooded, according to Dr. Robert T. Orr, curator of birds and mammals at the California Academy of Sciences in San Francisco. He said the temperature of some species of inactive bats varies with environment. Live bats placed in a cold-room where the temperature was kept between 40 and 50 degrees F. soon had about the same temperature. Dr. Orr pointed out that the cold-room conditions are about the same as in the caves in which the bats sleep through the winter. When roused from sleep, the little bats vibrate "like B-29s warming up," the scientists said, "and rapidly become warm and ready for flight." Sheila and Richard Nygaard, Mrs. Oma J.
