Q. Please define the term "stainless steel." G. C. S.

A. The expression "stainless steel" is a trade name applied to a low-carbon alloy steel of high chromium content. It is to a considerable extent corrosive resistent. The chromium content varies from 9 to 20 per cent. It was originally developed for use in the cutlery trade.

Q. In what way does nonnegative differ from murder? A. F. N. A. Homicide is a broader term. It signifies the killing of one by another. Murder is inperson by another. Murder is in-tentional and unlawful homicide.


