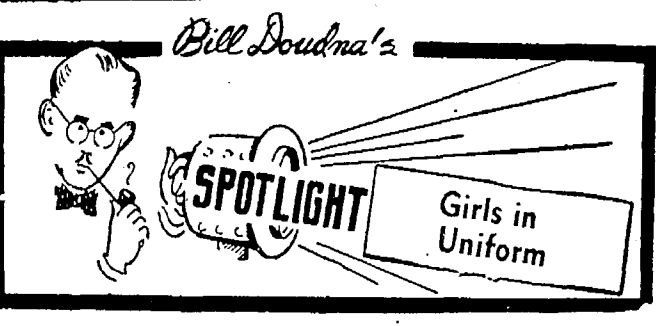

The 64-piece, all-girl drum and bugle corps of Spang post No. 570, American Legion, is headquartered in Madison this week.

Parades and concerts are on the schedule, as are a couple of nationwide broadcasts. The first of the radio shows will be aired Saturday from the Ft. Atkinson Municipal auditorium over the Mutual network.

The girls arrived in Madison on Sunday and went to Janesville for a parade Monday. Today they were to visit Delavan, Elkhorn, and Whitewater.

Whether they'll put on a show in Madison is still problematical. Besides being a parade unit, the troupe becomes—for broadcasts and concerts—a 44-voice chorus and 20-piece orchestra.

All the members are veterans of World War II. Some were WAVES, some WACS, some Spars, some Marines.

The summer season will be climaxed by an appearance at the national American Legion convention. The group was organized only last year, but ranked 13th.

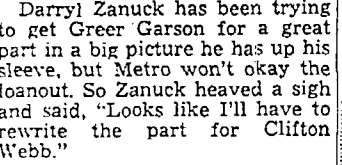

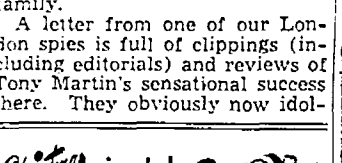
Flo Marley May Take Lead in Boothe Film

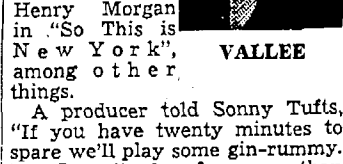

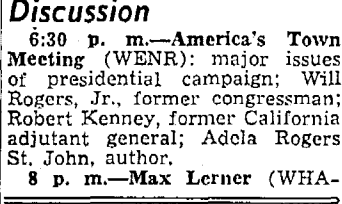

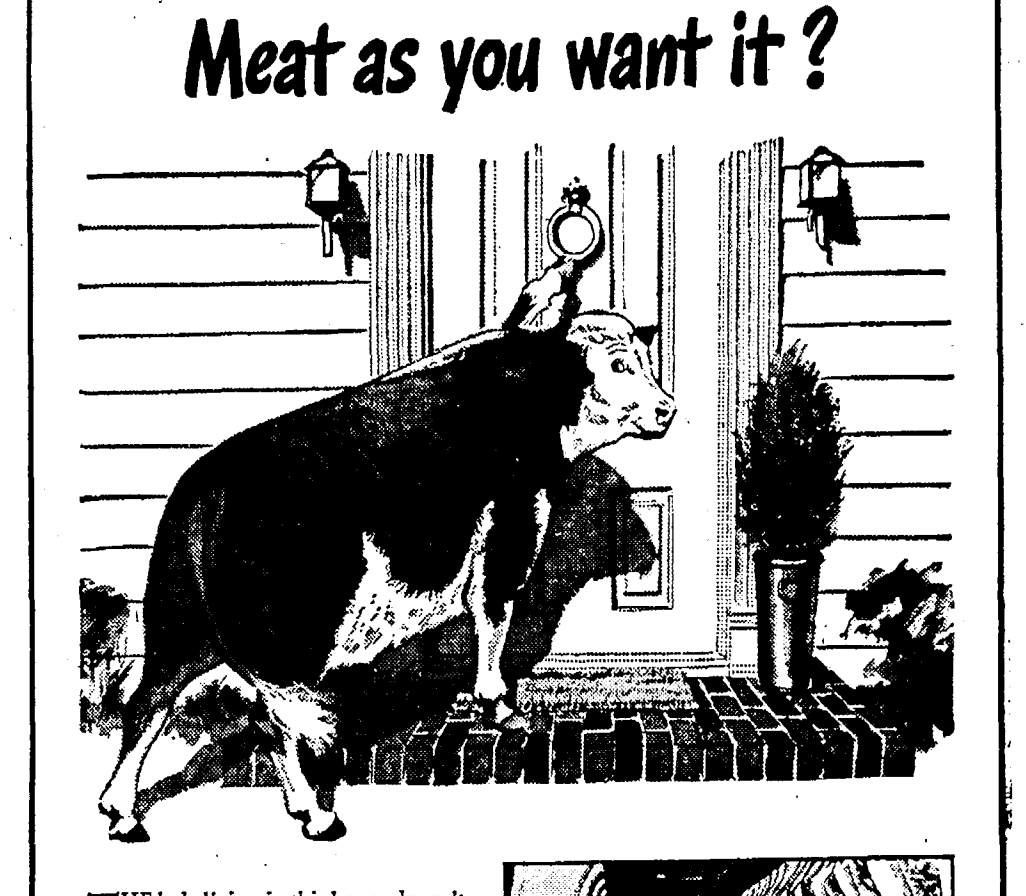
