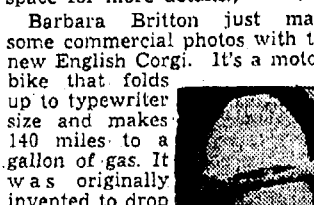

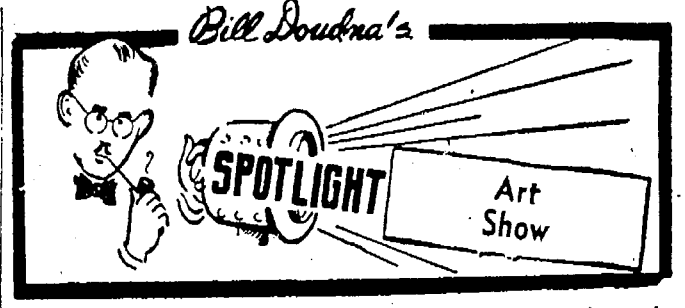

An exhibition of work by four University of Wisconsin graduate students will open Friday in the main and theater galleries of the Memorial Union. The artists are Robert Hodgell, Earl Kurtz, James Storey, and John Wilde. All have been teaching in the university art education department.

The show will close July 26. A notice from the Wisconsin Union gallery committee, its sponsor, has this to say about the artists:

"Hodgell, who was born in Mankato, Kas., in 1922, is represented by several large oils and some casein paintings. The work he does is of an experimental nature in oil, wax, and casein. At present he is living in Madison and working on a mural for the State-Fair Centennial agriculture exhibit.

"Entirely in the graphic field is the work of Kurtz, who comes from Manitowish, where he was born in 1921. Although his special medium is wood engraving, the entire field of graphics interests him because of its simplicity and directness of expression. Kurtz is now living in Madison and hopes to be teaching next fall.

"Storey, being interested in the design and pattern of everything that goes on about him, works in many fields. He was born in Storm Lake, Ia., in 1918. He begins teaching in September at the Pennsylvania College for Women, Pitsburgh.

"Wilde, whose show in the Union gallery last winter created much discussion, was born in Milwaukee in 1919. Wilde is both a draughtsman and a painter. His interest in the psychological-imaginative in the subject matter of his work involves him in meticulous planning. Wilde currently has a two-man show with Dudley Huppler at the Gallery studios in Chicago.
