Now he's chairman of the music department at the San Francisco State Teachers college. When Chrisman finished high school, he went to the University of Michigan and, upon graduation, became assistant to William Revelli, bandmaster at Hobart. When Revelli went to Michigan, Chrisman went with him.

During World War II, Chrisman served as band leader with the army air force. Upon discharge, he went to the San Francisco post.

Voluntary Steel Allocation for Defense Asked
WASHINGTON — (UP)— Pres. Truman Thursday gave the steel industry a chance to work out a voluntary program for allocating steel to cover requirements of the armed forces.

He has authority, under the new draft law, to require steel producers to channel their production to meet armed forces needs.

But the president told Commerce Secretary Charles W. Sawyer in a letter to develop at once "a voluntary allocation program . . . covering the requirements of the armed forces for steel mill products and steel contained in manufactured products."

This indicated that the government's allocation power under the new draft law would not be used if the industry could develop, in cooperation with Sawyer, a satisfactory allocation program on a voluntary basis.
